Our Session

This session is designed to discuss and brainstorm if and how **tCL could or should become an 'innovation space'**. As a community of practice, tCL has been successful for nearly 14 years in building a community, sharing information and best practices, regularly holding two conferences a year, publishing the collected efforts of its members, and fostering networking at different levels among its members. Our community model is at steady state and we could continue in the same vein for the future. An alternative, or a complement, to the steady state is **creating a space where innovation happens** - innovation in business practices, in applying new frameworks, in creating new platforms, in using digital technology to foster creativity and change. If we choose to go this route, what would the 'space' look and feel like? How different would it be from our steady state? How would we have to organise? Can we do it on our own? Could we better leverage Oxford and HEC?

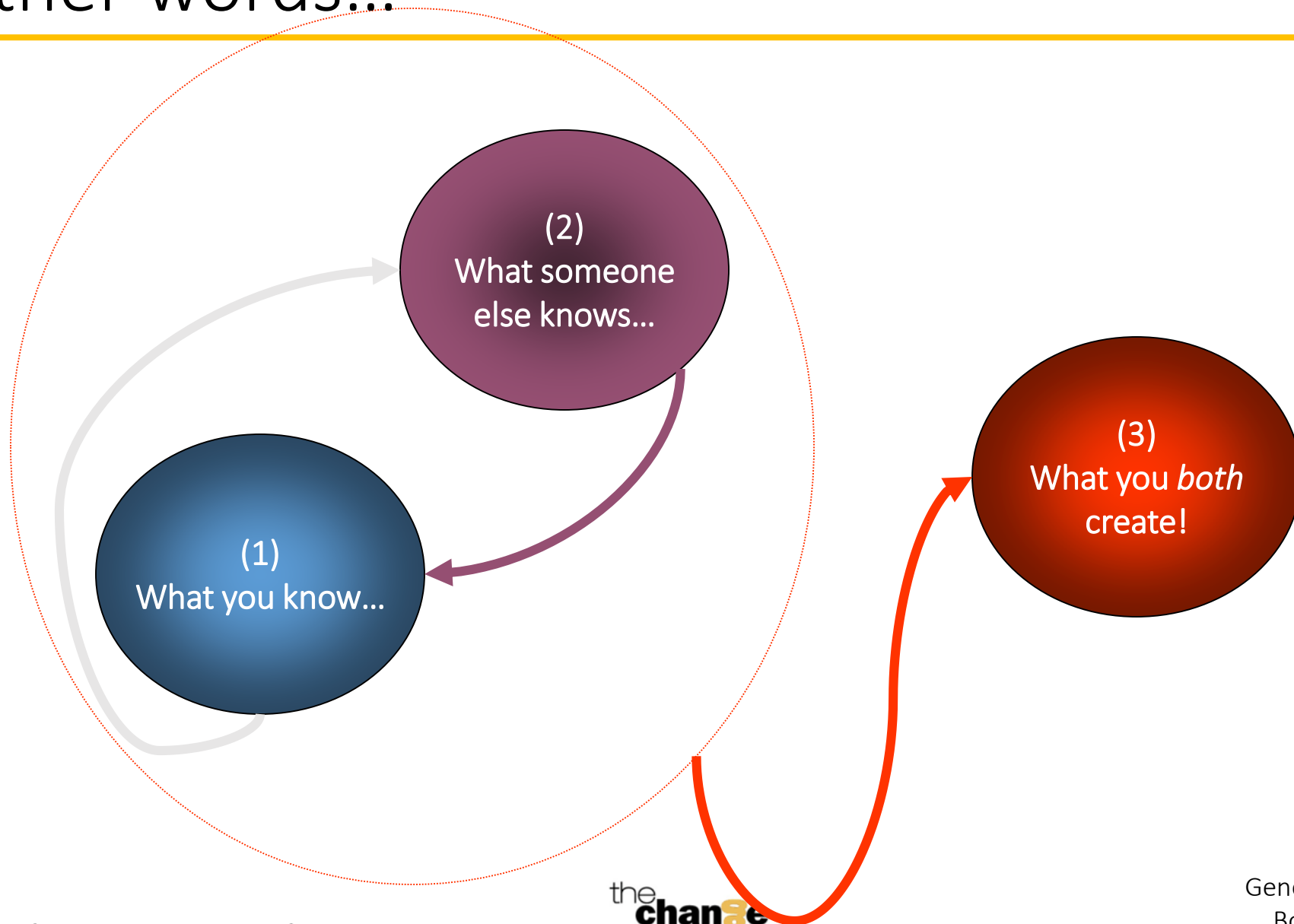
What is World Café?

- World Café is a *conversational process* based on a set of *integrated design principles* that reveal a deeper *living network pattern* through which we co-evolve our collective future.
- **As a conversational process**, the World Café is an innovative yet simple methodology for hosting conversations **about questions that matter**. These conversations link and build on each other as people move between groups, cross-pollinate ideas, and discover new insights into the questions or issues that are most important in their life, work, or community.
- **The integrated design principles** have been distilled over the years as a guide to intentionally harnessing the power of conversation for business and social value. When used in combination, they provide useful guidance for anyone seeking creative ways to foster authentic dialogue in which the goal is thinking together and creating actionable knowledge.
- **As a living network pattern**, the World Café refers to a living network of conversations that is continually co-evolving as we explore questions that matter with our family, friends, colleagues, and community.

Design Principles

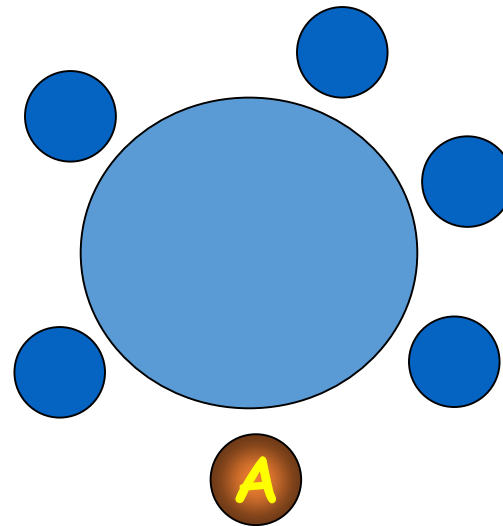

Requirements/Set-Up

- Requirements for it to work:
- 30-50 people in total
- diversity of the group (analysts, experts, executives, operations, support areas, etc)
- a topic of interest to all (transformation)
- collaboration and acceptance



Set-up

7 Tables
5-6 people/table
1 topic/table
1 host (anchor)
Several rounds

Process for the World Café

1. Each table is hosted by an anchor, who has developed a topic for discussion

2. Participants freely choose a table in which to participate (6 to a table)

3. The anchor welcomes the participants and explains or clarifies the topic to be discussed

4. The anchor leads the discussion to generate ideas regarding the topic, for roughly 15 minutes

5. The anchor captures the ideas on a flipchart, and at the end of the round thanks the participants

This constitutes *one round*. And the process is repeated for two or three rounds total. That is, for each round, the participants rotate to other tables (and topics), and hence provide their ideas to at least two different topics. The anchor just builds on the prior round's discussion to avoid redundant ideas. After the rounds are completed, each anchor will debrief the general assembly based on their notes.

Role of the Table Anchor (Host)

- *Participant and steward*, not a formal facilitator
- You stay at the table when the others rotate out
- Share the essence of the conversation with the next round of guests (remember: the topic stays at the table; the guests rotate)
- Take notes of all of the ideas (which build upon each round)
- Transfer to a clean slate the ideas that have emerged during the two or three different rounds to debrief with assembly
- Summarize the conversation at your table and send to the session facilitator within 48 hours

Typical Topics – Warm-Up

1.- Recall a conversation you had where real learning took place and insights emerged. Describe it. What allowed it to happen?

2.- What is the one question, that if explored, would allow this project to move forward?
